

# Glamorous Premiere

66 The film challenges her relationship with Cairo and her own identity

Last night at the GFF Plaza sparkled with glamor as it hosted the red carpet for the world premiere of The Inevitable Journey to Find a Wedding Dress, directed by the talented Egyptian filmmaker Jaylan Auf. She was accompanied by her film's stars-Asmaa Galal, Salwa Mohamed Ali, Yasmin Raeis, and Ahmed Khaled Saleh-alongside producers Mohamed Hefzy and Tarek Nasr, and DOP Omar Aboudoma. Competing in the GFF Feature Narrative Competition, the film follows Warda, whose frantic

search for a wedding dress on the eve of her ceremony transforms into a profound journey of self-discovery, challenging her relationship with Cairo and her own identity.

Following the red carpet festivities, the highly anticipated film screening began. Jaylan Auf is an accomplished independent filmmaker, field producer, and assistant director. She completed her German Abitur in Cairo in 2005 before earning a bachelor's degree in Political Science at the American University in Cairo,

with double minors in Film and Theatre. She holds a Screenwriting and Production Diploma from the University of Southern California. Since graduating, she has contributed to diverse projects, including films, animations, news coverage, and documentaries. Jaylan has produced content for prominent news channels during and after the revolution, covering significant events and creating documentaries like We Are the Giant and Baha'i Minorities in Egypt.

## CineGouna Closing Night



Tonight marks the closing ceremony of the GFF CineGouna, where the winning projects of the CineGouna Funds in development and postproduction will be announced. This year, 13 projects were selected from over 230 submissions.

Filmmakers are eligible for cash prizes of US \$15,000 each and additional awards from local and international partners, along with mentorship and industry exposure.

Winners of the CineGouna Shorts Awards, powered by O West, will also be revealed, awarding **EGP 2,250,000** for three projects. Eight finalists will pitch their projects to a jury of industry experts.

## Joanna Hadji Thomas and Khalil Joreige

## On Memory in Cinema

In a captivating session at the CineGouna theater, acclaimed filmmakers Joanna Hadji Thomas and Khalil Joreige, recipients of the GFF 2024 Career Achievement Award, engaged in a thought-provoking dialogue about the intricate relationship between storytelling and memory in cinema. Moderated by esteemed film critic and professor John Michel Frodon, the conversation delved into their artistic journey, the unique challenges of filmmaking in Lebanon, and how personal narratives profoundly influence their work.

Joanna shared insights from her personal experiences, illustrating how connections and memories can inspire creative expression. This theme is particularly evident in their film *Memory Box*, which addresses the complexities of familial relationships and the act of rediscovery. Set against the backdrop of Lebanon, the film explores the lives of three generations, centering on a mother who aspired to be a photographer. The narrative unfolds when her daughter uncovers a box filled with her mother's notes—intimate writings that were never intended for public view.

Khalil emphasized their commitment to authenticity, highlighting the extensive visual research he undertook, capturing nearly 10,000 photographs to enrich the film's storytelling. Both filmmakers acknowledged the difficulties inherent in the Lebanese film industry but remain dedicated to creating narratives that resonate with their audience. Their innovative approach to scriptwriting involves sharing only the final version with actors, fostering a unique collaborative dynamic. Through their dedication to memory and narrative, Joanna and Khalil continue to make a significant impact on the film industry, both locally and internationally.

# **Reviving NutShell**

Yesterday, the GFF 7<sup>th</sup> Classics program featured a special screening of *Nutshell* (1995), a restored version of the film directed by the iconic Khairy Beshara. The restoration was expertly undertaken by Sameh Fathy, a film critic renowned for his encyclopedic knowledge of Egyptian cinema. The event took place at the GFF Auditorium, with the esteemed presence of Beshara, actress Rania Mahmoud Yassin—who made her debut in the film—and Fathy himself.

Among the audience were students from the German Hotel School in El Gouna, who engaged thoughtfully with the film's themes during the Q&A session. Beshara reflected on the film's long period of neglect, stating, "This film was very underrated. It's a rebellious film that the media doesn't like." He expressed gratitude for its restoration, emphasizing that *Nutshell* is a timeless work that transcends its era. Yassin echoed this sentiment, highlighting how the film gave voice to a new generation of actors, many of whom have since become prominent figures in the industry.

Fathy shared his joy in fulfilling Beshara's dream of restoring this cherished film. Audience members praised the film for its relevance, with one student noting the effective use of music to enhance its atmosphere. Beshara was pleased to learn that, despite its realistic portrayal of everyday life, the film also resonated with a surreal quality. At its core, *Nutshell* explores the decline of a hotel run by Raouf, who hosts a food-eating contest that inadvertently reveals profound social struggles.





## The Cost of Public Persona

Huda El Mufti remarked during the "Building Actors' Persona on Social Media" panel: "Celebrities reveal only what they wish. I'm not someone who enjoys sharing my failures." This statement underscores the tension between authenticity and curated online personas. Moderated by Mohamed Omar, the discussion


explored how to navigate public identity on social media. Ahmed Malek emphasized the importance of distinguishing constructive criticism from negativity, highlighting the need for resilience. The panel illuminated the unique challenges artists face in balancing personal truths with the pressures of their digital presence.



## Film Restoration: A Longer Life

On the seventh day of the GFF, a distinguished panel convened to discuss film restoration and its vital role in preserving cinematic history. Moderated by Egyptian filmmaker Ahmed Nabil, the



Marianne Khoury emphasized the importance of film restoration in reviving classic works and safeguarding intellectual property. Ahmed Nabil stressed the necessity of quality preservation, while Nuria Sanz Gallego discussed UNESCO's Memory of the World (MOW) program, which promotes the preservation and accessibility of documentary heritage, particularly focusing on Egypt's audiovisual legacy.

The discussion included Nabil's recollection of a lost French film shot in Egypt and efforts to restore



works by filmmaker Youssef Chahine. The panel addressed the transition from film reels to digital cinema, underscoring the cultural significance of preserving original cinematic experiences.

Mathilde Rouxel reflected on her restoration work for Lebanese director Jocelyne Saab, highlighting how these projects connect new generations to historical narratives. Tamer El Saeid discussed the advantages of modern technology in restoration while cautioning against altering a film's original essence. Khairy Beshara concluded by sharing the story of Abdelhamid Saeed, a pioneer in developing Egypt's Cinematheque, stressing the cultural importance of restoration. The session reaffirmed that film restoration preserves not just images, but also the cultural values they represent.

# GFF: Bridging Business and Art

Yesterday at the GFF Hub, a panel titled "The Two Businesses: How Can the Corporate World Contribute to Art and Culture in GFF" featured prominent industry leaders, including Mohamed Amer, CEO of El Gouna; Yasser Shaker, CEO of Orange Egypt; and Mohamed Abou Ghaly, Senator and CEO of Abou Ghaly Motors Group. The session was moderated by Amr Mansi, Co-founder and Executive Director of GFF.

Mansi opened the discussion by expressing gratitude for the panelists' presence and support, emphasizing the significance of collaboration between the corporate sector and the arts. Amer remarked on the intrinsic connection between business and art in Gouna, stating, "This is something in the DNA of Gouna."

Shaker discussed the complexities of choosing brand ambassadors, highlighting that mutual benefit should take precedence over commercialization.

As the discussion concluded, the panelists reiterated that corporate support is essential in cultivating a vibrant arts scene, enhancing creativity and innovation, and ensuring that art continues to thrive in Egypt and beyond.
